## HYMN DISCOVERY Teaching Steps



## "I Love Thee"

This happy hymn comes to us from the early 19th century traditions of Sacred Harp hymnals, singing schools, and shaped-note notation. The theology of "I Love Thee" is direct and straightforward and the tune and harmony are elegant in their simplicity. The tune uses only five pitches, making it ideal for Orff accompaniment. This hymn expresses the greatness of our Lord and the joy of our faith while challenging us to prove the faith we sing through our actions!

#### **KIDPages**

Use these pages:

- With children who arrive early
- In a small learning group
- As a take-home page. If a page is sent home, suggest that parents and children work on the KIDPage together.

#### **Dig Deeper**

Use this page to help children analyze the contents of the text and to teach the meaning of some of the words.

#### Name That Note

Introduce children to the history of the hymn and the shape-note tradition. Use the page to introduce the pentatonic scale and to help children learn note names.

#### The Shape of Faith

This page teaches a Bible truth related to the hymn text as children decode a puzzle.

#### "I Love Thee" Orff Accompaniment


Use this easy Orff arrangement to provide a handson music activity to accompany the hymn. Have children play the first two measures eight times as the hymn is sung. Hold the last note of the hymn as the accompaniment is completed.

#### "Love Thee" Worship Feature

Enlist readers to present scripture readings before each stanza. Assign bell ringers to play underscore music using the pentatonic scale as the scriptures are read.

# Name That Note

Jeremiah Ingalls (1764-1828) was only 13 years old when his father died from hardships suffered during the Revolutionary War. Jeremiah and all his brothers and sisters were musical. He compiled a hymnal titled The Christian Harmony which included "I Love



Thee." The music notes were made of different shapes, as shown below, rather than the oval noteheads used in most hymnals today. The melody of "I Love Thee" uses the five pitches of the pentatonic scale: do, re, mi, sol, and la.



# "I Love Thee" Worship Feature

Enlist readers to read the scripture passages before each stanza. Assign ringers to play the bells from the pentatonic scale quietly and randomly during the reading of the scriptures.

Ptiches needed:

Reader 1: I love you, O Lord, my strength. The Lord is my rock, my fortress, and my deliverer.

Reader 2: The Lord is my portion; I promise to keep your words.

### Congregation sings Stanza 1

Reader 1: Let the righteous be joyful; let them exult before God; let them be jubilant with joy.

Reader 2: My God will fully satisfy every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus.

### Congregation sings Stanza 2

Reader 1: Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places,

Reader 2: just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love.

### Congregation sings Stanza 3

Reader 1: In Judah God is known, his name is great in Israel. His abode has been established in Salem, his dwelling place in Zion.

Reader 2: O come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation!

### Congregation sings Stanza 4
